**Sample answer:**

Xiao Hong does not have enough money to buy all the items she wants for the upcoming formal.

### Question 3

Criteria	Marks
• Demonstrates a sound understanding of what the father expects Fang Fang to do	3
• Demonstrates some understanding of what the father expects Fang Fang to do	2
• Provides some relevant information	1

**Sample answer:**

The father expects Fang Fang to pick up her grandma from the train station (at 8:30 pm) and to let him know that her grandma has arrived. He also expects her to take her grandma to dinner.

### Question 4

**Sample answer:**

Students will likely participate in the proposed opportunity of teaching English online because they can make money without commuting to work and the working hours are flexible. They can also connect with people from all over the world.

### Question 5

**Sample answer:**

The speaker justifies that studying languages is not a waste of time by listing advantages in the workplace, such as companies preferring to hire workers who can speak foreign languages to save costs, and colleagues working better with multilingual people who understand and communicate better.

### **Sample answer:**

Ai Ling advises that young people should:

- participate in extracurricular activities to find out and develop their interests
- manage time well in order to cope with a busy life
- be persistent in working towards their dreams/goals.

## Question 7

### **Sample answer:**

Peter tries to convince Na Na to buy an electric car. He uses contrast to show that electric cars are more environmentally friendly than petrol cars, and he uses rhetorical questions such as 'Don't you know that the petrol is very expensive now?' to highlight that electric cars are more economical. He also uses parallelism to list the benefits of having more people buy electric cars, such as cheaper prices, more charging places and better service.

**Sample answer:**

The mother conveys her surprise at being told her son will be driving to Uluru with his friends through her exclamations of 'What?' and 'so far away!'. She feels concerned about their safety and asks him, 'is there something wrong with your brain?' and 'do you want to drive or swim there?', to highlight the long driving hours and heavy rain. She becomes relieved when her son explains that they will take many rest breaks, however she feels helpless at the end, saying 'I have no way to deal with you...' when she realises that her son hasn't planned accordingly for the car since they plan to return by plane.

**Sample answer:**

The author is prompted to write this diary entry because he wanted to make his girlfriend happy/celebrate their anniversary, however the date turned out differently from what he expected.

#### Question 9 (b)

**Sample answer:**

The text reveals that the author is a generous and accommodating person who is willing to spend any amount of money to make his girlfriend happy, as shown by him renting her favourite luxury car. He is also considerate as he brought Lan Lan a sun umbrella since she doesn't like to be in the sun.

**Question 9 (c)**

**Sample answer:**

The documentary has drastically impacted on many aspects of Lan Lan's lifestyle. As it advocates for less resources to be consumed and less animals to be killed for fashion, Lan Lan replaced her luxury clothing and accessories with old clothing and fabric bags. She has become more environmentally friendly as she chose to walk instead of drive in order to reduce air pollution. She willingly picked up rubbish on the beach, even though she would never have touched filth before. She also took the advice of the documentary to consume less meat by only eating a salad at the restaurant.

Martin writes his first post to ask for advice on which city he should go to, as he is planning to study in China.

### Question 10 (b)

**Sample answer:**

Li Yue advises Martin to come to Beijing because it provides the best and most convenient life as a capital city. She states that he won't feel bored, as Beijing has a combination of both the old and modern. Also, Beijing has many universities for Martin to choose from.

### Question 10 (c)

**Sample answer:**

Li Yue and Da Shan both use rhetorical questions to appeal to Martin. They both employ listing to demonstrate the benefits of the respective cities, as Li Yue lists the cheap and fast means of public transportation in Beijing, while Da Shan lists the various places that people come from in China to live in Shenzhen.

Li Yue uses contrast between Beijing, Xi'an and Shanghai to show Beijing is better than other cities. She also uses data to show there are many good universities for Martin to choose to study. On the other hand, Da Shan uses parallelism and repetition to emphasize that Shenzhen is a young city for young people to work in 'young industries'. He also uses a simile to tell Martin that Shenzhen is like a plain piece of paper, full of potential for young people.

### Question 10 (d)

**Sample answer:**

Martin will most likely go to Shenzhen next year. As he wants to experience a different lifestyle, Shenzhen would be more ideal as he has never been there before, whereas he has been to Beijing several times and disliked how Beijing's changing weather which caused him to suffer illnesses each time. Shenzhen is also known to be China's Silicon Valley, which appeals to Martin as his university major is computer science and he wishes to work in technology in the future. By meeting young people from all over China in Shenzhen, Martin would be able to improve his Chinese skills, as well as learn technology-related terms.
