- Hat
- Sunscreen

Question 16 (b)

Sample answer:

The company can deter the theft by hiring security guards and installing temporary fencing. This dual approach deters intruders with human presence and a structural barrier, greatly improving equipment protection during staff absences.

Sample answer:

To enter the industry successfully the work placement student should consider extending their work experience by seeking additional opportunities with the company. Moreover, they could enquire about potential traineeships or explore tertiary courses to further enhance their technical skills and qualifications.

Sample answer:

The live stream is flowing into the mixing desk instead of flowing out of the mixer. This signal flow should be in the opposite direction as the live stream is an output. A power cable has been used to connect the mixer into the projector. The projector does not receive power from the mixing desk. There is no data cable provided to send the signal from the mixing desk to the projector.

Question 17 (b)

Sample answer:

The role of the vision system technician is to operate the system during the graduation ceremony which would include switching between inputs such as the cameras and laptop. They will monitor the live stream and troubleshoot any technical issues that arise.

Sample answer:

The fixture should have a safety cable attached to the bar to stop it from falling and safe access to lighting bars using an EWP or correct ladder usage.

Question 18 (b)

Sample answer:

Conventional lighting fixtures can get hot. The tungsten will emit an amber glow known as tungsten drift. These lights occupy one channel on the desk and are coloured with gel. LEDs receive digital instructions using multiple DMX channels, require lower wattage, are cooler, and can be RGB, meaning they can change to a range of colours.

Question 19 (a)

Sample answer:

A condenser microphone requires phantom power which is sent as +48 V from the audio desk or from a battery.

Question 19 (b)

Sample answer:

The audio technician uses the audio peak meter to gauge the signal from the individual input channels to monitor the output to minimise the audio signal peaking in the red section and distorting or exceeding the required decibel limit.

Question 19 (c)

Sample answer:

The radio frequency of the microphones may have dropped out from the receivers. The audio technician could try the microphone in a different location to see if the signal is re-established. The microphones could be resynced to re-establish connection. The batteries located in the microphone could be running low. If this is the case the batteries will need to be replaced.

Sample answer:

Effective strategies could include the use of open and closed questioning. A potential barrier to communication would be the different languages spoken by patrons. A solution to this could be to have signage and information sheets published in a range of different languages. The customer service representative could have a device to access translation tools such as Google Translate. Gestures also have different meanings in different cultures.

Sample answer:

When working with people at school, students would have a greater level of control and use informal communication as they are more familiar with each other, such as text messages between students. At the professional venue there would be formal emails. When working with the staff from the professional environment, there would be a higher expectation to use industry-standard and technical terminology.

Staff would also need to modify their communication from informal communications to making sure they are in contact with the theatre for organising access to the theatre at specific dates and times. They would also need to coordinate with theatre staff when they need to access various theatre staff and resources.

Answers could include:

- Comparisons between the sizes and types of scenic elements used for each venue
- Quantities of scenic elements required for larger venue
- Training and skills needed by crew to handle the scenic elements in each venue
- WHS, PPE and hazards relating to the different scenic elements
- Naming and description of specific scenic elements suitable for either venue as below:
 - Small venue
 - Use of flats
 - Drama boxes
 - Set pieces moved by students
 - Small furniture pieces
 - Minimal wing/backstage space
 - Larger venue
 - Set pieces moved by automation/wagons
 - Fly systems
 - Revolves
 - More storage space backstage/dock areas
 - Use of trained staff
 - Collaboration between defined departments and roles
- Naming and description of specific production elements suitable for either venue as below:
 - Lighting
 - Audio
 - Vision.
