Sample answer:

Yes. The daughter offers to drive the dad to and from dinner so that she can use the car. Even though she had an accident, it wasn't her fault. She also offers to wash his car.

OR

No. Despite her offer to wash the car, drop him off and pick him up he would still probably say no as he needs the car himself tomorrow night and is still concerned about the accident she had even though it wasn't her fault.

Sample answer:

Yanti offers to buy the tickets from him. She also reminds him that there is another tour next year. She points out that Jakarta now has a lot of new malls. She encourages him to think more about his sick grandmother than himself.

Sample answer:

Someone who has an interest in Alice Springs would be suitable. The suitable applicant would also need to be able to hold a conversation in both Indonesian and English, and get on with others. The applicant should enjoy the outdoors and camping.

Sample answer:

His parents recognised his talent and moved the family to England to attend a soccer academy. His teacher taught him the discipline needed for success. Although practice and looking after health are important, the most important factor was his religion.

Sample answer:

Paul tries to convince them to volunteer overseas, by describing his own experiences as a volunteer in poor communities. He lists some of the hardships he saw.

As a result of the eye-opening experience he had, Paul changed his career path choosing to study psychology.

As a former student of the school, Paul is able to encourage the audience to think about people less fortunate.

Sample answer:

Young people who are adventurous would be interested in this activity. They need to be fit and healthy. People who don't suffer from medical conditions would also be interested. They should also care about the environment.

Question 15 (a)

Sample answer:

Santi has written the post to encourage her friends to support her involvement in the upcoming marathon.

Question 15 (b)

Sample answer:

The first strategy she uses is to provide information about the marathon and to tell them about her training.

Next, she reminds them of when her own cat needed medical assistance. She also justifies where the money she raises is to be used.

The final strategy is to make it easy for her friends to donate by providing a direct link to the relevant web page.

Sample answer:

The author is very effective in making their point, providing detailed information to support this opinion. Mohammed Zohri is mentioned as a good example, being a junior world champion in athletics. Also, Priska is a successful tennis player but Ash Barty is more well known in Indonesia.

Further, the author quotes the sports minister to strengthen his argument. Statistics are provided to support the argument, such as for every 100 people who watch English football, only 7 watch national games.

Frequently questioning adds to the effectiveness, challenging the reader eg 'how can this situation be changed?'

The final paragraph challenges the reader to join in and learn about these Indonesians.
